ACT ONE

In a kingdom far away, life is a joyless existence of monotonous toil under the brutal supervision of the ambitious Karl.

Leonardo, a dreamer, escapes the oppressive routine while the king scolds his rebellious teenage daughter for listening to loud pop music.

The king announces he will award half the kingdom and his daughter's hand in marriage to whoever can invent the country's most incredible thing and present it in a competition at the palace.

As everyone excitedly plans their entry, Karl, hungry for even more power, plots how he might turn the competition to his advantage.

Alone in his room, Leo senses Princess' distress, imagining her forced to comply with her father's wishes.

He becomes determined to save her by winning the competition, but time is running out. Suddenly, the inspiration in his head takes the solid form of three muses representing concentration, love and courage, who help him to assemble his extraordinary invention.

Princess escapes from the palace but encounters Karl and his followers brawling in the street. The announcement that the competition is about to start allows her to escape Karl's unwelcome attentions. ACT TWO

Leo is declared the winner and everyone rejoices but, fueled by envy, Karl steps forward and crushes the clock

Karl claims his price of half the kingdom and Princess' hand in marriage, forcing her father to the ground.

Leo is dragged away by Karl's henchmen and the king is left alone to regret his actions, imagining the grim marriage his daughter must now endure.

The citizens return to the grind of their daily lives without hope, and there is a somber black wedding for Princess and Karl.

The imprisoned Leo is powerless to save her until he receives another visit from three muses who help him rebuild the incredible clock.

These spirits drive Karl to his death, proving that the power of creativity will always defeat the forces of destruction.

The darkness of the kingdom is filled with color and light as Leo and Princess are reunited.

There is a new, joyous ceremony for Leo and Princess' wedding.
